# **Ancestry.Com: Meet One of the Four Titans of Family History Websites**

In a previous posting of October 17th, I presented a summary of the power and appropriateness of the four titans of family history websites: **FamilySearch**, **Ancestry**, **MyHeritage and Findmypast**. **FamilySearch** has already received an overwhelming amount of editorial coverage in this Facebook group as the beacon for abiding entry-level through professional-level genealogists. In this posting, there are excellent step-by-step web tutorials and videos that can provide invaluable assistance on how to best use Ancestry.com.

Why is there a need for Ancestry.com? There are specific reasons for using Ancestry's personal tree feature:

- No-one can change your personal tree
- Trees generate hints for sources, stories, photos, and media
- Ancestry.com has unique data search engine
- Ancestry.com helps you find relatives who also have trees, photos, sources, and stories about your ancestors
- Your personal tree allows you to transfer data between Ancestry.com and FamilySearch Trees

But there's so much more to consider. Ancestry is the most-used genealogy data subscription site. Anyone can click on the Learning Center tab and then First Sties for a site orientation. Many how-tos in the Family History 101 section are free to use. Once you have a membership (which members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints can obtain for free), you can search digitized records and indexes from around the world. Use the Family Tree tab (if you're a member - or if you're using Ancestry.com at a library) to create your family tree and post photos and stories, which you may share with others. Because of the sheer size of personal family trees posted on Ancestry.com, there is a good possibility that you may be able to link up with others who are working on similar ancestors world-wide. Consider these facts: Ancestry hosts the world's largest online collection of family history records with 20 billion records in 80 countries of origin with 100 million family trees and 13 billion connections. 15+ million people have used their DNA tests. There are 1+ billion searches monthly and 179 million app downloads thus far. Free technical phone support is available at: 800-615-6560

But non-members can also use all of them for free at any of our 5,100 family history centers in 140 countries throughout the world. See the October 19th posting to learn where and how to find these local family history centers in your locality that are readily available to both our members and the general public.

Already have a Family Tree in FamilySearch.org and don't want to manually create it again in Ancestry? You can import a GEDCOM file into Ancestry or you can import up to four generations to Ancestry at a time directly from your FamilySearch account. But you can also add another four generations to one family ancestor line at a time directly from FamilySearch after that if you desire to import your full pedigree brought in.
