#### **Closing Comments** with the Power of Prayer, Fasting and Dedication

When I started family history over 50 years ago, I immediately started gathering civil and church records in America to provide information for original research purposes in preparation for researching my Eastern European ancestors where I had very sparse information about. This research was accomplished before personal computers and Internet were readily available so I gathered Ma Bell phone books from all over the country. Fortunately my surname is not very common and I knew what areas of the USA to get the phone books from and they were all FREE. Consequently I was able to find Catholic churches and cemeteries in the Yellow Pages as well as potential relatives and wrote "blind letters" to them.

But when it was time to do research my maternal grandmother in Poland, I ran into a "brick wall." I knew both where she was born and when. But the Polish communist government wouldn't give me any information. And didn't know how/who to contact the Catholic Church in her village directly since I could not write in Polish and did not have the language skills to call a remote parish priest at significant international phone rates. In fact the Polish government ultimately wanted to charge me \$100 for a single baptismal certificate that they never found.

In 1996, I took my entire family to Eastern Europe and was able to visit the villages that my ancestors originated from in order to network with the local priests. And yes, I got a little bit more family history information in subsequent trips in 1998 and 2001 than I previously had. However, the biggest event was on my fourth Eastern European trip in 2009 when I hired an awesome professional Polish genealogist. We then traveled together to Poland and visited the same villages and churches. And to my pleasant surprise, my professional genealogist genuinely has the "Gift of Tongues." Six months later, he was able to convince the priests that I was doing genealogy for family history purposes and he visited them all again without my wife and I. Consequently the priests of three neighboring villages opened up all their books to my genealogist and the genealogist was able to ascertain generations of additional information that were not previously available either by Church microfilms or through the Polish government. To this present day I am indebted to that genealogist because he still continues to do original family history work for me in other areas of Poland and now in the Czech Republic as well through the power of prayer, fasting and dedication to this genealogical work. Below are the blue mimeograph copies of both the cover letter and previous sample data list compiled to simulate interest. It worked as I receive new information. Note: My research

covered many USA states and several Canadian provinces. And all individuals listed in the 1970's are now deceased. My timing was very pertinent.
