

Philadelphia, August 23, 1753. RUN away on the 24th of June last, from the subscriber, living near Trenton, in Burlington county, an Irish fervant man, named Timothy Linch, about 25 years of age, about five feet fix inches high, of a reddifh complexion, inclinable to be freckled, has a down look, talks very thick, with the brogue on his tongue, and has feveral fcars on his left leg: Had on when he went away, a half-worn bearfkin coat, with fist metal buttons, an old check fhirt, with a large patch on the fhoulders, new ozenbrigs trowfers, thread flockings, new floes, an old felt hat, and cap. Whoever takes up and fecures faid fervant, fo that his mafter may have him again, fhall have Forty Shillings reward, and reafonable charges, paid by TROMAS HOOTON. Ð




Chart showing the immediate descendants of William Penn [Genealogy Chart Collection]
