

Closing Comments

In my genealogy, there have been unique times when additional resources were later found to further solidify my original research. One example is that my grandfather ran away from home at the age of 16 when his step-dad's home in Clifton, New Jersey burned down in 1902. Consequently the family was then moving to Ambridge, Pennsylvania enroute to Waukegan, Illinois. Instead of relocating with his family, he opted to not show up the day of their moving. His rationale was that his step-dad would automatically take all of his future earnings. He changed his name to Michael Kovac so he could not be found later. In 1939 during World War II, I was able to obtain a delayed birth certificate in Paterson, New Jersey some 50 years later which verified his birthday and his parents which till this day there are no civil records available except his baptismal certificate in Shenandoah, Pennsylvania. Now with both of these records, I can piece his linkage together more accurately.



What to evaluate when

Consider these choices early in the evaluation cycle



- Will the selected evaluations represent the breadth of the organization?
- Have you selected the right balance to cover corporate, sector and country level issues?
- Do you need to cover 100 percent of the portfolio or only a part of it?
- What types of evaluation will work best? Self versus independent evaluation?
- Where is deeper evidence needed?
- What is likely to have the biggest impact on institutional results and performance?
- When is the evaluation needed and by whom?
- Are the issues too complex for one evaluation?
