Meet the "Four Titans": the Most Popular Research Resources in the Family History World!

The most popular major resources for conducting family history research are **FamilySearch.org**, **Ancestry.Com**, **My Heritage and Find My Past**. Each of them offers unique opportunities to create your own family tree plus network with others worldwide to learn of possible relationships with massive amounts of historical collections of records. The latter three are all subscription based with annual fees but fortunately members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints with a FamilySearch.org account can opt for free memberships in the latter three making these four titans readily available with incredible resources for anybody and everybody in doing their family history pursuits. Together these four popular Internet resources with their free accounts, you have an incredible amount of resources waiting for you to find your ancestors near and far. Each one of them is distinct and justifies the time to explore them more fully than described below. In subsequent postings, I will share on-line tutorials on how to take full advantage of each one of them. **Note:** the annual subscription package and FindMyPast is \$239.40. But non-members can use all of these resources for free at any of the FamilySearch family history centers as there are 4,600 local facilities in 126 countries. These Family history centers are free and open to the public and staffed by knowledgeable volunteers.

Why not take advantage of these landmark research resources? Read on ...!

FamilySearch.org is one of the most popular genealogical resources in the world. The site is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and is free and available to the public. Since launching in May 1999, more than 150 million people have visited FamilySearch.org to learn more about their family heritage.



Online Records

Visitors to FamilySearch.org can search billions digital images and indexes of records from all over the world. These records include government and church records for births, marriages, and deaths; censuses; probate records, land records, draft cards; and so forth. Millions of new records are published on a weekly basis.

Many of the records on the FamilySearch website are indexed, making them easier to search. The indexes are created by volunteers. Currently, there over 125,000 active indexers around the world who complete about one million names a day. Anyone can help with this effort, regardless of their age, religion, or technical background; all that is needed is a computer and an Internet connection. The free online application is available in seven languages.

Research Help

FamilySearch.org features several resources to help people learn how to discover their family history. For example, this Wiki is an interactive online encyclopedia for family history research. This site contains research helps, guides, and advice from FamilySearch experts, but is also a place where anyone can share what they know about genealogy. Visitors to the site can search by geographic area or to get tips and helpful information on climbing their own family trees.

Through FamilySearch Forums, individuals can post questions about their own research and FamilySearch staff or anyone from the genealogical community helps answer them.

Free online classes available on the FamilySearch website can be taken anytime from the comfort of home.

The length and format of the classes vary by subject, but usually include video of the presenter, a PowerPoint presentation, and class handouts. Many of these classes are taught by experts at the renowned Family History Library in Salt Lake City, but FamilySearch has also partnered with individual genealogists and facilities like the Midwest Genealogy Center in Independence, Missouri.

There is free telephone help seven days a week with FamilySearch at 866-406-1830 from 6 am till 10 pm Mountain Time Zone daily except for Monday evenings ending at 6 pm.

Understanding the Collection:

The indexes at findmypast are based on exactly what was written in the census regardless whether it is right. Every census year is searchable except the 1871 census is not searchable by birthplace. Corrections can be submitted; however, they will not make a change if it does not reflect exactly what is written in the census, even for simple spelling errors of names or place names. When searching the census you should be aware of this. Refer to the <u>census wiki article</u> for details about the census.

- Passengers include not only immigrants and emigrants, but also businessmen, diplomats and tourists.
- Images of the passenger lists are available to download, view, save and print.

- Living Relatives search includes the latest electoral roll information.
- Telephone data is updated monthly as well as historical director information.

Its History

Formerly named 1837online.com, **findmypast** were the first to put the birth, marriage and death records of England and Wales online, for the purpose of allowing public access to the indexes. Previously, the indexes were only available to search at certain locations in England. This achievement garnered the prestigious Queen's Award for Innovation in 2007.

Findmypast.com was acquired by <u>brightsolid</u> (formerly Scotland Online) in December 2007 as part of their vision to develop a world class family history resource.

Searching is free on findmypast.com, as is building an online family tree with the innovative Family Tree Explorer software. To view the records you will need to purchase credits, either by buying PayAsYouGo credits or a subscription option.

Since our launch findmypast.com has expanded markedly from just birth, marriage and death records to now include the 1841 through 1911 censuses for England and Wales, an extensive collection of military records, a number of occupations directories and an electoral roll search.

In November 2006 findmypast.com, in association with The National Archives,

launched <u>ancestorsonboard.com</u>. Ancestorsonboard contains exclusive, full-colour Passenger Lists for all ships leaving the UK from 1890-1960. These records were previously available only from the National Archives at Kew, London, and weren't indexed, meaning that searching them was notoriously difficult.

In January 2009 findmypast.com, in association with The National Archives, launched <u>1911census.co.uk</u>. 1911census.co.uk is the home of the official release of the 1911 Census of England of Wales, two years ahead of schedule.
